## Smith named purchasing director

Allan Smith, bursar for Tarrant County Junior College South campus, has been named director of purchasing for TCOM, pending approval of the North Texas State University Board of Regents at its Nov. 21 meeting.

Smith, who has worked with the state purchasing system for 13 years, will begin his new position Nov. 10, according to Milton Glenn, business manager.

Smith said, "It is a great pleasure to help TCOM build and grow and the only way it can go is up."

A native of Wichita Falls, Smith has been at TCJC South campus for nine years. Prior to that, he was director of purchasing for the Tarrant County Junior College District and was purchasing agent for Midwestern University in Wichita Falls.

Smith has attended Midwestern University, Centenary College in Shreveport, La. and The University of Texas at Austin. He and his wife, Jeanne, have two sons.

## Dr. Reeves to attend Austin meeting

Dr. James B. Reeves, TCOM assistant dean, has been invited to represent TCOM Nov. 11 in Austin at one of six Public Forums on Domestic Policy scheduled throughout the United States.

Chaired by Vice President Nelson Rockefeller, the forums are designed to help achieve citizen participation in the review of President Gerald Ford's domestic policy by providing an arena for public fact-finding, for the exchange of ideas and for exploring policy alternatives.

Assisting the vice president will be a team of cabinet members.

The day-long forum will be divided into two major sections with

witnesses testifying before a panel of Federal officials during the morning and four simultaneous meetings during the afternoon session.

Rockefeller will preside over the morning session at which eight expert witnesses will discuss selected domestic issues. In the afternoon, the cabinet members will preside over four separate meetings to hear testimony from the public.

Governors and witnesses from Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico and Oklahoma have been invited to participate.

The four areas of domestic policy to be discussed are economic growth, including employment, capital formation and governmental regulation; resource development, including energy supply, environmental concerns and food policy; social policy; including income support policy and health finance and delivery; and community building including transportation, housing, land use and education.

Statements obtained during the Public Forum will be considered by President Ford in preparing his state of the union address.

At press time, Dr. Reeves had not received information from the White House indicating his area of participation in the forum.

## Osteopathic Seals Campaign underway

The national Osteopathic Seals campaign is underway and TCOM's Students' Wives Auxiliary is working to make this year's campaign a success.

Suzan Garner, SWA president, said the SWA hopes to raise \$1,000 this year which will be sent to the AOA and used for student loans and research.

In announcing Dr. Skinner's resignation, Dr. Jim Pearson, dean of the NTSU College of Arts and Sciences, said, "Dr. Skinner wants to get back to research and teaching."
