Meeting features TCOM faculty

When the Arizona Osteopathic Medical Association convenes its annual meeting in Scottsdale, Ariz., May 13, five TCOM faculty members and one administrator will be there to serve as speakers and moderator for the various sessions.

Dr. Edward T. Newell, associate dean for clinical sciences, will serve as moderator. Faculty members participating in the program are Dr. Jay G. Beckwith, chairman of the department of medicine; Dr. John H. Harakal, chairman of the department of osteopathic philosophy, principles and practices; Dr. Thomas R. Turner, clinical associate professor of surgery; Dr. Frank J. Bradley, clinical assistant professor of radiology; and Dr. Robert Garmon, lecturer in medicine.

Dr. Beckwith will speak at two sessions May 13 on "New Diagnostic Aids in Gastrointestinal Disease" and "Pancreatic Problems." On that same day, Dr. Harakal will speak on "OPP&P as Applied to Gastrointestinal and Pancreatic Problems" and Dr. Garmon will speak on "Evaluation and Therapy of Common Pulmonary Infections."

On May 14, Dr. Bradley will speak on "New Diagnostic Aids in Nuclear Medicine," Dr. Turner on "Degenerative Joint Diseases," Dr. Garmon on "Evaluation and Management of Airway Disease" and Dr. Harakal on "OPP&P as It Applies to Bronchopulmonary Problems."

During the final day of the convention May 15, Dr. Turner will speak on "Joint Replacement and Reconstruction."

Regents approve appointments

The North Texas State University Board of Regents approved the appointments of an associate dean for clinical affairs and an assistant dean for basic health sciences for TCOM at its regular meeting on the NTSU campus Friday, April 23.

Dr. Charles A. Kline, professor and chairman of the department of pediatrics at Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine, will become as-

sociate dean for clinical affairs on Aug. 1, replacing Dr. Edward T. Newell who will retire at the end of the academic year, according to Dr. Ralph L. Willard, dean. Dr. Kline also will serve as professor of pediatrics.

Effective Sept. 1, Dr. Charles Gordon Skinner will become assistant dean for basic health sciences and professor of chemistry. He has served as chairman of the NTSU chemistry department since 1972 and has been a member of that faculty since 1964. He is replacing Dr. J.K.G. Silvey, associate dean of basic health sciences, who is returning to assignments in the NTSU biological sciences department and Center for Applied Sciences, according to President C.C. Nolen.

Other appointments approved by the regents include Donald E. Keen, as pharmacy consultant to the outpatient clinics; Dr. Westley E. Raborn, instructor in surgery; Dr. Gary Neisler, instructor in anesthesiology; and Dr. George Esselman, professor of medicine. Dr. Jarvis Bull was named acting director of emergency medicine and assistant professor in general practice until Aug. 31.

The regents also voted to change the title of Dr. J. Warren Anderson from assistant to the dean to assistant dean for medical education, effective Sept. 1, and Dr. Virginia Reddick was reinstated in the rank of assistant professor of anatomy after a two-year leave of absence.

The proposed Medical Services, Research and Development Plan which will provide for the management of professional income of full-time faculty physicians of the medical school also received the endorsement of the Board of Regents. In explaining the program to the board, Dean Willard noted that under the plan clinicians are able to work to generate funds for the college, and in turn benefit from those funds.

In other action, the regents:

- * authorized the transfer from "Unallocated Balance" funds to provide support equipment for the senior clerk in the Physical Plant area, a new position approved at the Friday meeting;

- * approved the appointment of Dr. Samuel B. Ganz of Corpus Christi, president-elect of the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association, to the TCOM Dean's Advisory Council.

- * approved the hiring of a full-time, permanent senior clerk in the
