D. Luibel is AOA president

When Dr. George J. Luibel accepted the presidential gavel of the American Osteopathic Assn. (AOA) last Tuesday (July 20) in Washington, D.C., he became the first national president from Texas since 1939 when the late Dr. Phil R. Russell directed the organization.

Dr. Luibel's noon installation at the Mayflower Hotel climaxed two days of events honoring him as the incoming AOA president.

He ended his year as president-elect on July 19 and was honored at a reception that evening in the Grand Ballroom of the Mayflower Hotel. Hosted by the Texas Osteopathic Medical Assn., (TOMA), the reception featured Texas style hors d'oeuvres with 100 dozen miniature tamales having been shipped to Washington.

Attending the reception from TCOM were Dr. Ralph L. Willard, dean, and Dr. Marion E. Coy, founding president.

The founder and former chairman of the board of TCOM, Dr. Luibel is a 1936 graduate of Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine. In addition

to his membership in the AOA and TOMA, the new national president is active in the Tarrant County Assn. of Osteopathic Physicians & Surgeons (TCAOPS) and the American Academy of Applied Osteopathy (AAAO). He was named a Fellow of the AAAO in 1962.

Dr. Luibel is president of Fort Worth Osteopathic Hospital, Inc. and a member of its Board of Directors.

A general practitioner, he practiced in Ennis and Ferris prior to moving to Fort Worth in 1946.

Dr. Luibel's new position will extend the already long list of offices he has held with numerous organizations. He served as president of TOMA from 1950-51, president of the AAAO in 1957, president of the Kirksville College Alumni Assn. in 1962-63 and president of TCAOPS from 1947-48. He is a past member of the TOMA Board of Trustees, vice-president of the AOA from 1963-65 and a trustee of the AOA. He has served as a lecturer for both the national and state organizations and with the Graduate Instruction Program of the AAAO. He has also been published in the Journal of the AOA.

In preparation for her Sept. 5 trip to Atlantic City Miss McCollum is working on her talent, tan and wardrobe, according to B. Don Magness, chairman of the board of the Miss Texas pageant. The Miss America Pageant will be telecast on NBC, Channel 5 television Sept. 11 from 10 p.m. - midnight.
