## TCOM to award 100th degree

TCOM will pass another milestone in the College's short history during Commencement exercises for the fourth graduation May 21. When the doctor of osteopathy (D.O.) degrees are awarded TCOM will surpass the 100th mark in the number of graduates having received degrees. A total of 146 will have been awarded since the first ceremony in 1974.

During the 2 p.m. Commencement ceremony at Will Rogers Memorial Auditorium student-doctor Maria Driscoll of Laredo will receive the 100th degree from TCOM.

During the commencement exercise TCOM will also award its first honorary degrees since becoming a state supported college of osteopathic medicine. The three honorary doctor of humane letters degrees will be presented to Drs. George J. Luibel, D.D. Beyer and Carl E. Everett, founders of TCOM. During TCOM's last graduation as a privately funded institution, Dr. Henry Hardt, the first dean of the College, was presented the first honorary degree awarded by the College.

Serving as marshals for the graduation will be Dr. Elizabeth Harris, chairman of the Department of Microbiology; and Dr. C. Raymond Olson, chairman of the Department of Medicine.

A reception hosted by President Nolen will be held in the Round-Up Inn immediately following the graduation ceremony.

Master of ceremonies for the evening will be Jay Sandelin, chairman of the Dean's Advisory Council and vice-president of Fort Worth National Bank. Offering the

toast to the seniors will be Dr. George J. Luibel, president of the American Osteopathic Association. Representing the senior class and responding on its behalf will be Fred White, president of the Class of 1977.

## Awards to highlight banquet

When the TCOM Class of 1977 attends the reception and Senior Awards Banquet May 20 at Colonial Country Club, they will be the guests of honor. The 55 graduates will be joined by their family, friends and TCOM personnel at the first event of the graduation weekend.

Highlight of the evening will be the presentation of the annual awards to the members of the graduating class. The awards to be presented include the T. Robert Sharp General Practitioner of the Year, Wayne O. Stockseth Award for osteopathic excellence, Upjohn Achievement Award for academic achievement, Sandoz Award for leadership and academic excellence, Sigma Sigma Phi Outstanding Graduate Award, Best Clinical Science and Best Basic Health Science Professors and Mosby Book Award.

Speaker for the banquet will be Dr. Feliks Gwozdz, chief medical examiner for Tarrant County and adjunct clinical professor of pathology. Dr. Gwozdz has entitled his speech "Notes and Quotes by Gwozdz."
