Regents approve Med Ed II site

The North Texas State University Board of Regents met in special session Nov. 17 at the Airport Marina and voted to build Phase II of TCOM within the presently approved site boundaries at Camp Bowie and Montgomery, provided adequate land and funds are available. The regents serve as the governing body for TCOM.

Phase II of TCOM's campus consists of Medical Education Building II, which was authorized by the last Texas Legislature. The basic science building, which is in the planning phase, will a \$15.5 million structure near the college's \$12.4 million clinical science building now under construction.

Following the meeting, Dr. Ralph L. Willard, dean, said, "I'm pleased with the action of the Board of Regents. It will enable us to move forward and continue building a first class professional college of osteopathic medicine. The decision's logical and will permit us to grow in the most educationally sound and cost effective manner. The most important beneficiaries of today's decision are the people of Texas who our graduates will serve in years to come."

By unanimous vote, the board also adopted a statement of policy which states that NTSU and TCOM will be operated as sister institutions under the governance of the Board of Regents and the administration of President C.C.

Among the other items the statement directs are that:

*all sites utilized for osteopathic

medical education or for any other health care professions which are or may be brought under the regents shall be designated and referred to as a "North Texas State University Health Sciences Center":

*campus graphics at TCOM site or sites shall be identified as "North Texas State University Health Sciences Center/Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine" with the correct abbreviated form to be NTSU/

In action dealing with personnel, the regents approved Mary McAnally as supervisor for the Medical Services Research and Development Plan and approved Dr. Merritt Winchester as a science associate II in the Department of Biochemistry. Ms. McAnally received a bachelor of arts degree in business administration in 1950 from Texas Tech and has worked as office manager and bookkeeper for Motheral Printing Company and Shannon, Gracey, Ratliff & Miller. Dr. Winchester received a bachelor of science , master of science and doctor's degrees in organic chemistry from Clarkson College of Technology in Potsdam, N.Y. He has worked for Ethicon, Inc., a Johnson & Johnson Co., and was on the faculty of Clarkson College.
