-ing freed slaves and their offspring. Later, under the direction of Bishop



William Paul Quinn, the name was changed to Paul Quinn College and in 1972 the College was fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). PQC relocated to Dallas in 1990 with the first enrollment of 1020 students and a curriculum that included business, legal studies, education, science and technology. Dr. Michael J. Sorrell is the current President of Paul Quinn College which is still affiliated with the African Methodist Episcopal Church. PQC is committed to educate servant leaders who are able to become change agents in their communities.
