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

Parking lot nears completion

The Med Ed I parking lot is expected to be ready for use by November 1, and TCOM police chief Don Beeson has explained that some parking regulations and vehicle registration will be necessary. Registration of cars will enable the police officers to be sure that only TCOM personnel use the parking lot in which parking will be on a first come, first served basis with reserved spaces for administrative officers only.

Employee parking permits will be \$8 per year. Student permits, \$5 per year, are included in the fees paid at registration. Administrative officers will pay \$15 per year for reserved spaces. Beeson explains that these fees, reasonable in comparison to parking fees at neighboring colleges and universities, are necessary for maintenance of the parking lot and security. The lot will be lit at night and patrolled at all times.

Cars may be registered by filling out the forms available at TCOM Police Department, Med Ed I, Room 830C. Employees who do not intend to use the parking lot do not need to register their cars.
